- Children can come to school wearing their PE kits on PE days – Tuesday and Friday.



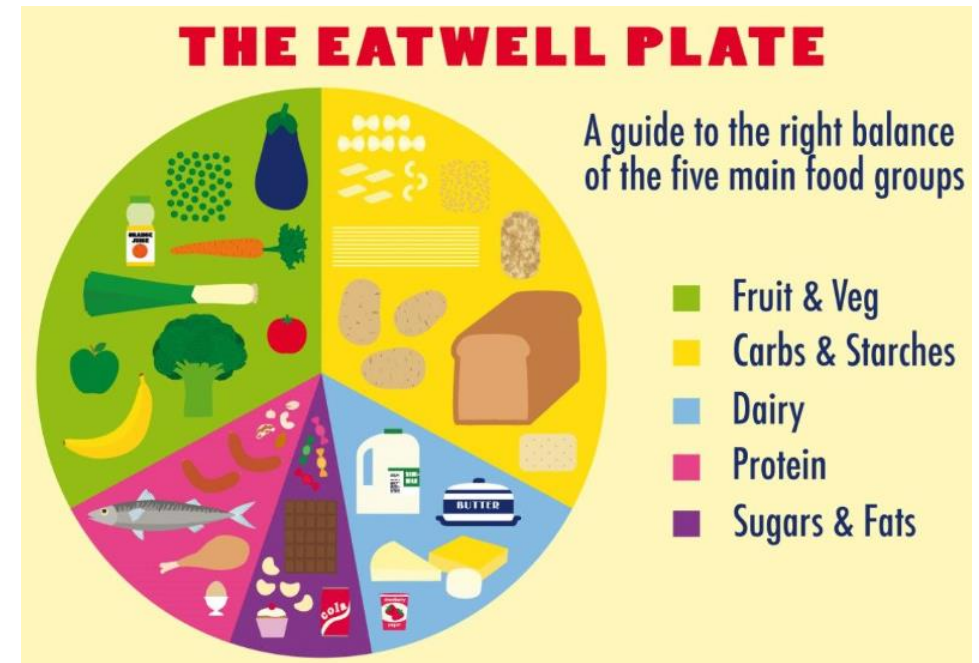
Healthy Eating

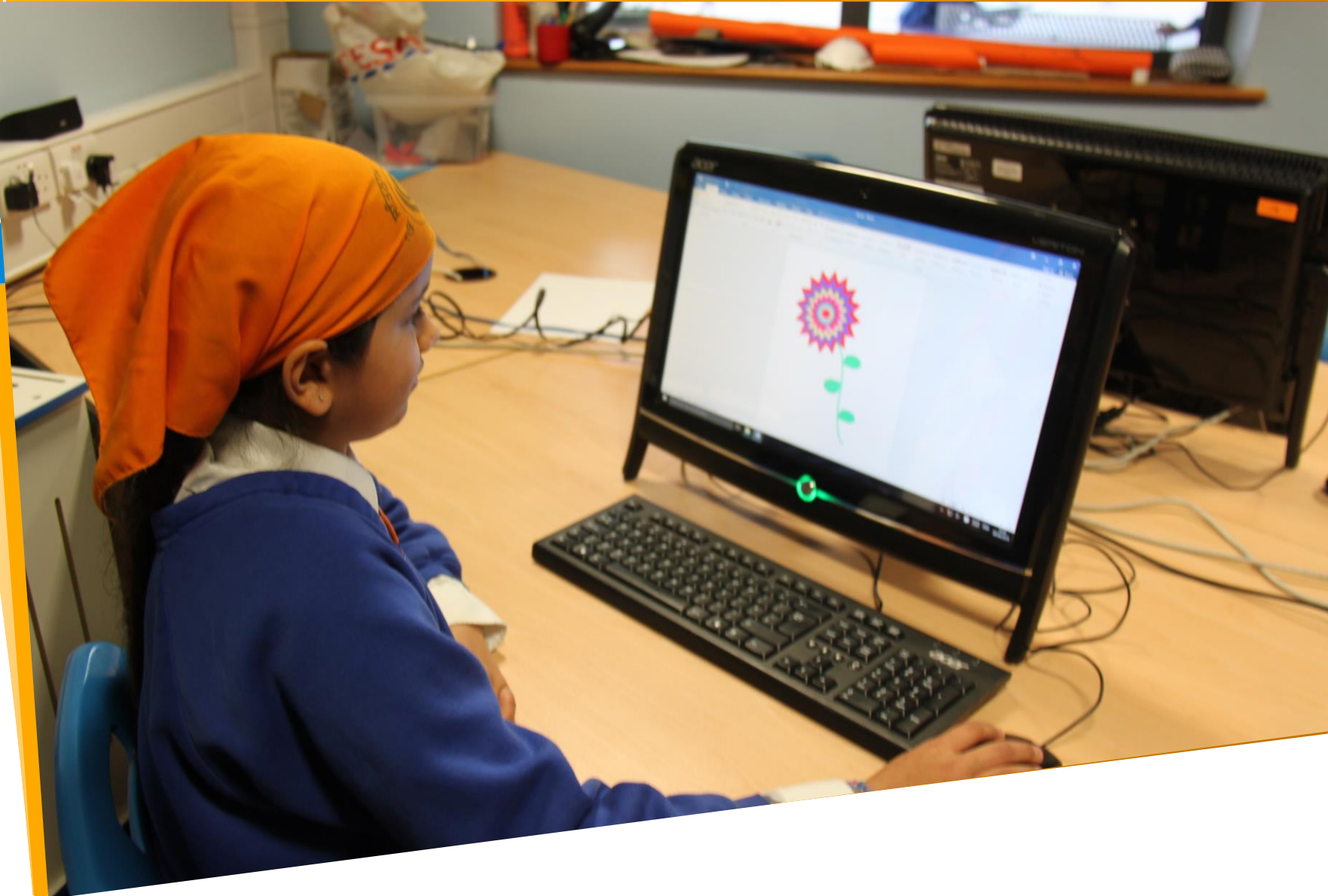
To communicate with either of us please speak directly to teachers or staff outside on duty.

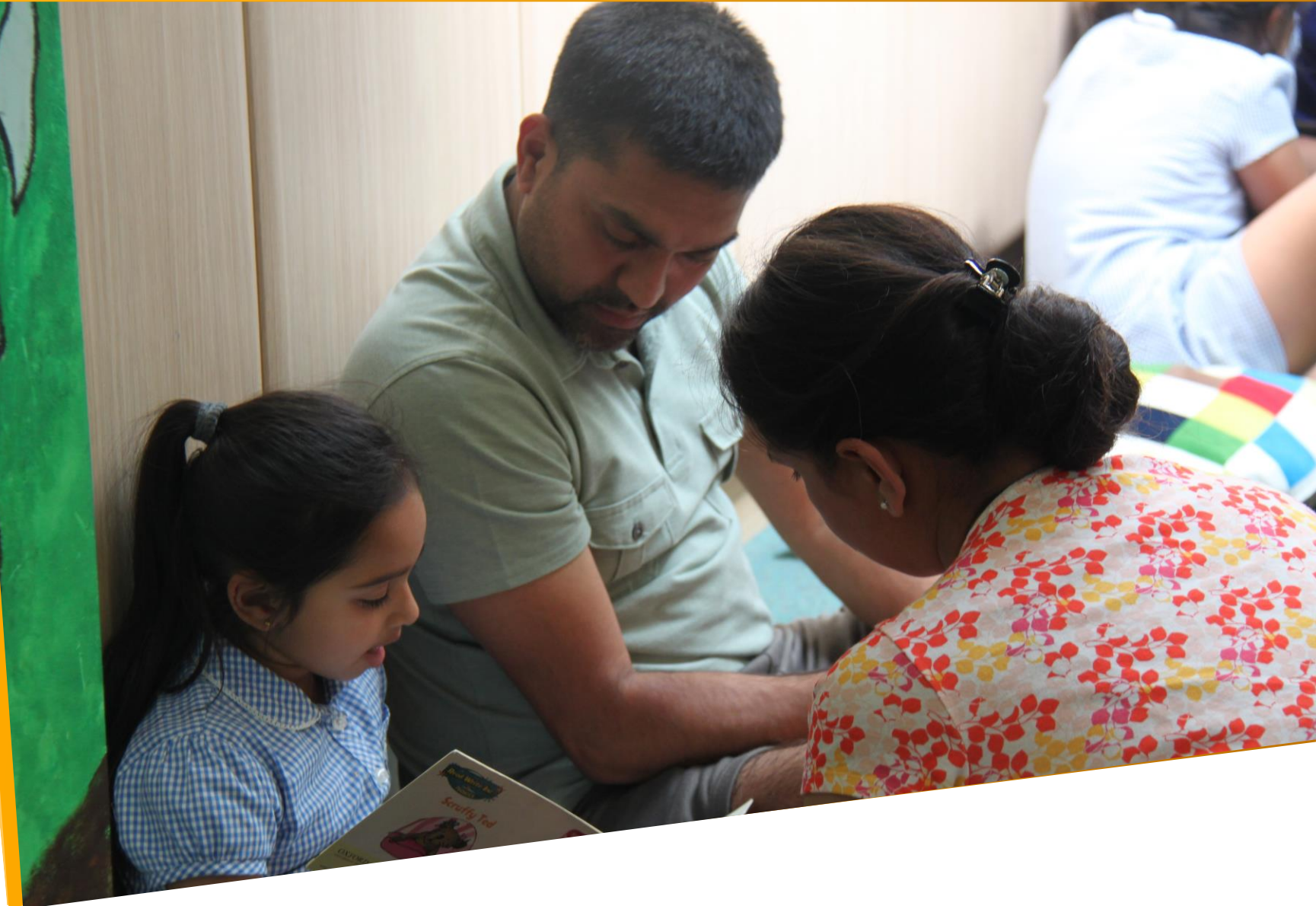
School newsletter is sent out every half term.

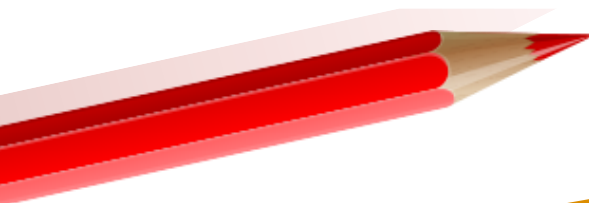
